Bus news

In the post-election atmosphere of cuts use it or lose it is even more important. The good news is that the buses generally seem to be running smoothly and the main road services that have been diverted to come through Quidhampton (some from as far as Shaftesbury) do usually arrive on time, although I have heard of buses not arriving at all on two occasions. The 08.06 to Salisbury is often full with standing room only and I've been told that the same is true of the 09.42 on market day.

Greater numbers of people seem to be getting off on the Wilton Road and walking into the village but we are told the bus company does not count these in their statistics.

Please let the parish clerk know if the bus service changes have affected you. We need to have accurate information, not impressions, if we are to be able to campaign for change or even just to keep our buses. We particularly want to know if you regularly cross Wilton Road to get a bus into Salisbury.
