## Notifiable plant in the leat: action needed

***Jean Kalvis explains:***

*The leat is a drainage channel which runs off the Nadder, then rejoins it further downstream. It looks like a slow flowing stream and runs through approximately 12 gardens in the east of the village and the wood behind them.*

Wiltshire Wildlife Trust (WWT) is surveying all the waterways in Wiltshire for

invasive plant species. They have found *Azolla* in the Quidhampton leat, a fern that looks like duckweed or moss, is invasive and blocks waterways. It is a notifiable plant and the WWT would like our permission to try to get rid of it using biological control.

This means introducing a weevil which feeds only on *Azolla*.

For this to be successful, everyone who has the leat running through their garden would need to allow WWT to look at their section and give permission for them to introduce the weevils where needed and later to check that the weed had gone.

**There is no charge for this but if we do not act WWT can enforce action and then we would have to pay.**

Please would all those concerned give me a contact name, address and telephone number by the end of July, so that we can give WWT all the information in one go.

**WI National AGM, Liverpool** Joyce Harvey attended for the first time travelling to the new Echo Arena in the dock area, She reported: 2100 new members joined the WI in this its 96<sup>th</sup> year and hundreds of members are now under thirty years old. The organisation's impeccable records form a valuable social history of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The most interesting business is always the resolutions debate and this year was no exception. The first resolution condemning the closure of libraries was passed, but the second, calling on the government to refuse planning permission for factory farming, was more contentious. An organic farmer and the president of the NFU spoke so well on either side of the debate that after a most lively discussion the resolution was not voted for. Many delegates wanted to change their vote but had no power to do so. Nationally known speakers included Sir Steve Redgrave and delegates had the chance to visit the local area. Joyce thoroughly enjoyed the experience and said it was a privilege to be Quidhampton's delegate.

### **Netherhampton Road footpath**

**An extraordinary meeting of the parish council** was held on 14 June. 'Extraordinary' here means an extra meeting called to discuss a specific item, on this occasion the chance to apply for a footpath grant. Several councillors, led by Duncan Witt, felt this could be the chance to create a footpath beside the Netherhampton Road from Quidhampton to Netherhampton. Joining up with the path from Harnham and leading back to the village via Broken Bridges and Lower Bemerton, it would provide a valuable circular route for walkers, runners, and cyclists.

As with so many simple ideas the practicalities proved more complicated and the costs could be prohibitive. There was much enthusiasm for the idea, however, and it was agreed to look into it and the possibility of other funding as the deadline for July could not be met.

There will be updates at future meetings, *Editor's note: in the short time I have lived in the village I have heard many comments about the lack of footpaths. If you have opinions or ideas that might help with a grant application please get in touch with me or a parish councillor. The more support there is from potential users the greater the chance of success.*

## Wilton and District Link scheme: a locally run, good neighbour service.

*The parish council recently made a donation to the Link scheme. The editor talked to Dave Barnes, Quidhampton volunteer and treasurer, to find out more about it.*

There are over forty Link Good Neighbour Schemes in rural Wiltshire, each run by local people with the aim of improving the quality of life of their community.

### **What does a Link scheme offer?**

Help for older people and people with disabilities or illness so they can have access to services and social activities and remain independent for longer.

### **What kind of help can be given?**

- transport to e.g. medical and other appointments, visits to friends or family, day centres or clubs, collecting prescriptions, shopping
- company to sit and talk to
- reading aloud
- practical help such as filling in official forms, changing library books

98% of tasks requested in the Wilton and District group are transport, usually to medical appointments, shopping and the library. The drivers, other helpers and co-ordinators are all local volunteers. The scheme is based on the beliefs that the best help comes from the local community and that we all like to be and to have good neighbours.

### **Funding**

The expenses of all volunteers are paid.

Some funding, administered by Community First, comes from Wiltshire Council and several parish councils make direct donations. Users are asked to donate if they can and the donations are very important in keeping the scheme going. Some users or their families can be generous and donate regularly. Others are not able to donate and no comments are ever made nor any pressure put on them. Donations from elsewhere are also welcomed e.g. from a coffee morning. You can be sure every penny of your donation will go to help local people.

### **Volunteers**

Volunteers are needed as much as funds. After a Criminal Records Bureau check volunteers are given an information pack and go out with another driver to gain experience. As well as the usual benefits of volunteering the Link scheme offers flexibility. Co-ordinators fit tasks around the times volunteers are available. Many drivers have regular clients they enjoy seeing each week but the time you give can be changed to suit your needs.

In 2010 Wilton and District Link fulfilled nearly 1100 tasks. Imagine all those journeys and visits not being made. The community would be a much poorer place without them.

**Bemerton St John Primary School:**  
**headteacher retires**

*The editor talks to Estelle Smith about being headteacher at Bemerton St John, her career in education and plans for the future.* I'd heard only good things about Estelle Smith and when I met her I could see why everyone thinks so much of her and why Quidhampton and Bemerton were very lucky she came along to lead the school at a difficult time.

Estelle was part of the Wiltshire education team that worked with Bemerton St John's when the relationship between the headteacher and governors broke down a few years ago. Although she'd planned to continue working for the education authority until she retired, the attraction of Bemerton St John's was just too great. "Yes, it was a difficult time," she said, "but I could see the parents were supportive and the pupils were great and I decided it was a school worth fighting for." Estelle also felt it would be nice to give something back to Wiltshire as that was where she had begun her teaching career, much of which has been spent in village schools including being headteacher of a federated school in Dorset. All this experience and enthusiasm mean that Bemerton St John's has been transformed into a successful and popular school removing itself from Ofsted's special measures six months earlier than expected. Pupil numbers have risen from 170 to 194 and over 200 will be on roll in September, fifty per cent of whom come from outside the catchment area. Estelle



said she had to begin by re-building trust and making sure she kept parents and governors well informed about what she and the staff were doing. She believes clear expectations, communications and consistency are the cornerstones of a good school and is most proud to have re-kindled a love of learning through an improved and enriched curriculum.

Thanks to the involvement of parents and villagers the school is now an integral part of the community and Estelle feels she is leaving it as she would wish it to be. She describes it as "a village school in Salisbury." Her plans for retirement begin with a year out. "There were no gap years when I was starting out so now I'm going to have some time for me and my husband without whom I could not have achieved what I have." She told me he gave her not only emotional support but very practical support too by doing odd jobs in the school, and even working with small groups of pupils to give them extra help.

When asked what she will miss like most teachers she said, "The children." That may sound corny but teachers spend the majority of their working lives with children and it is

difficult to leave that behind. Children are endlessly interesting, usually full of energy and optimism, banter and bad jokes, and keen to make friends. They are the future -

that's why most of us go into teaching - and if you're lucky enough to work in a good school like Bemerton St John's there will be an irreplaceable gap in your life when you leave. On the other hand, you can take a holiday at whatever time of year you like and you'll never have to do wet playtime duty again. Estelle is looking forward to that very much.

She plans to spend a lot of time at their house in Spain, to visit her son who lives in the United States, to travel independently and to learn to play the clarinet. After that, who knows? Whatever Estelle decides to do it will be something interesting but the part she has played in the history of our village school will not be forgotten.



From early next year all residents will be entitled to a fortnightly garden waste collection but if you want to make use of it **you must apply by the end of September**. There is an application form on page 12 of the Summer copy of "Your Wiltshire Magazine" that should have been delivered to your home in June. You can also apply online at [wiltshire.gov.uk](http://wiltshire.gov.uk).



It is a free service but will be given only to households that apply. Some will not want a bin because they compost garden waste or have no garden.

There will be a roadshow about the new collection service in Salisbury Market Place on Tuesday **12 July** between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

If you have a bin for garden waste via the paid-for service you don't have to re-apply.
