Annual Parish Meeting, 28th May

was in a new format this year and village groups were asked to give a report.

1. The Village Entertainments Fund

John Cater, Viv Bass and Jonathan Young have taken over the Entertainments Fund from the group led by Ron Smith (thanks to Ron for looking after it for so long — something else he has done for the village). Accounts will be freely available and the group will report to the annual parish meeting.

The Entertainments Fund is quite separate from the Parish Council. It began with the increased social and community activity in the village following the 1995 VE Day anniversary celebrations. In 2004 the Entertainments Committee that ran these events ceased to exist and only the fund remained.

The fund administers the 100 Club and keeps half the profits, the other half going to the Village Hall (a bout £230 a year each.). It also receives the profits from village events associated with it e.g. fireworks evenings. It spends money on grants to village functions e.g. children's entertainer at the fireworks evening, underwriting the Bus Pass Christmas Party. The fund now stands at £2104.

Groups of villagers are invited to apply to the fund for projects or events. Any expenditure must be agreed by all members of the Fund group and if there were ever a problem a bout allocating the money there would be a meeting for all villagers to attend.

2. The newsletter

Bea Tilbrook has written the newsletter since June 2010, taking it on because she loves writing and believes in the importance of regular, good quality communication. She wants the newsletter to keep people informed, give them a chance to publicise things and allow them to have their say. She tries to make the language as clear and jarg on free as possible.

It is a joint production with her husband, Ken Taylor, who puts her writing into the computer programme 'Publisher'. Without him it could not be produced. (is there anyone else out there who can use Publisher in case of an emergency?)

Bea hoped the newsletter would enhance Quidhampton's sense of community and it seems to have been successful. Even people who disagree with things in it say they like it. She appreciates feedback but doesn't often get anything specific. People who have mentioned specifics say they like reading a bout big village events like the Jubilee and the interviews with villagers.

Funding has not been a real problem: people have been generous from the start. In 2010 – 2012 there were 28 issues sponsored by 35 residents and 6 organisations: The White Horse (2), the Parish Council (4), Salisbury Heart Support Group, the Entertainments Fund, Quidhampton Mill and the WI. People cannot afford to give so much these days so several people may sponsor one issue.

The cost to the village is £20 for four pages and £40 for eight. The last request for sponsors hip was a year ago and there is enough in hand for 10 eight page issues. This includes a 100 Club win donated by one couple, £40 sent from the USA by an ex-resident of Bemerton and £180 left from the table top sale. She loves the different ways the sponsorship money comes in, her favourite being when people simply put some money in her pocket in the pub.

3. The WI

Jennifer Tyler explained that Quidhampton WI began 19 years ago and two of the original officers are still in place — Jennifer and Joyce Harvey. Meetings are on the second Tuesday of the month and there are 15 paid up members. Subscription is £33, which includes a levy for national head quarters, entry to meetings, refreshments, and two bimonthly magazines. A cribbage group meets regularly and

theatre outings are arranged. There are 210,000 members in the UK in around 6600 different institutes.

The Quidhampton group needs to raise money for speakers and the hire of the hall but ways of getting income are limited. They used to provide teas for council planning meetings held in Wilton and for coach parties in the village hall but these events happen no longer. The ageing members hip is less willing to travel to other WI events or to join the committee. Although some groups have younger members local groups have a similar age profile. Realistically it is hard to foresee a long future for Quidhampton WI.

4. Chris Edge spoke about the Jubilee celebrations which reminded everyone of the

splendid community spirit and enjoyment shown at that time

Peter Edge, newly elected Wiltshire Council member for Wilton and the Lower Wyle Valley, was in attendance. He will attend all Parish Council meetings and is keen to hear from people (details on the back page). He offered to do a village walk with Parish council members.

Questions from the public: John Cater questioned the position of the fireworks and bonfire with regard to the road but was assured that everything met the health and safety requirements of the insurers.

They offered to help keep the playground tidy and to do fundraising towards the cost of new equipment. It was a well organised and professional presentation with a ccompanying catalogue and iPad illustrations and all the councillors present were impressed and in favour of doing something. It may be possible to get a grant from the area board.

Local people : The story continued

Chris Anderson's search for his father's plane

Chris Anderson's investigations into the death of his father, Flight Sergeant Douglas Beesley, in a Lancaster bomber in April 1944 had led him to a Belgian group called the Plane Hunters.

It was an exciting moment when they got in touch. Chris realised that they were a professionally trained, government accredited group of specialist archaeologists who excavated sites of World War Two planes all over Belgium. The Plane Hunters realised that at last they could find JA 695, the only one of the nine Lancasters lost on that A pril night to remain unfound. They'd tracked down and excavated the crash sites of the other eight and now, out of the blue, some one was telling them exactly where the missing one was.

How can you be so sure? the chairman, Benny

Ceulaers, asked. Chris's answer was simple: I have the letter sent by the MOD to my mother,

describing exactly where her husband was killed. And so two pieces of information came together in one of those magic moments historians dream about.

It took time to get the necessary permissions and for the conditions on the ground to be right but in November 2012 Chris and his son, Toby, stood in a potato field in Kievermont, now a suburb of Geel, watching the Plane Hunters team begin their excavation. Apart from perspex shards nothing on the surface indicated that the spot was anything other than undisturbed farmland, but they had already met two villagers who remembered the Lancaster coming down there. One of them, Clement Kempen, was fifteen at the time and his father was the first at the scene.

One crew member, flight sergeant A D Anderson (no relation), successfully ejected, was captured and became a prisoner of war. The tail gunner went down when the tail ripped off, and a nother crewman ejected but crashed fatally into a roof. A Nazi soldier ordered everyone away from the aircraft which burnt all night. The remaining bodies were removed the next day and the site guarded for several weeks until a specialist German team arrived to take what could be salvaged. Chris met a villager who showed him a hoe he still used made from metal he'd taken from the plane, despite the guard.

When the dig began last November no one was sure what they would find. The Plane Hunters group told Christhat family members had been present at other excavations they had done but never before had the son of one of the crew been present. It was a moving moment.

There were shards of perspex from the windows at ground level and Chris heard how some of it had been made into je wellery. There were also some traces of aluminium in the soil. Firm confirmation came when a small known Lancaster part from the bomb bay was dug up. Chris

has a diagram that shows exactly where this 70 cm piece fitted into the bombing mechanism.

The biggest finds were a large piece of a luminium cowling missed by both Germans and villagers, and a generator. The cowling was very deeply buried and had been surrounded by oil which preserved it. Photos of these are on the Plane Hunters website under RAF Recovery.

Chris was told he could 'poke around' in the field and he found some smaller

pieces including a piece of the plastic knob believed to be from the radio.

The Plane Hunters team returned to the site for a final dig earlier this year before potato planting. Among other small pieces they found a florin (a two shilling or ten pence piece) and a gold pen nib. They told Chris that only a navigator would have a pen like that on board the

aircraft, so it would be his father's.

Chris is astonished at how welcoming and helpful everyone in Belgium has been and how keen they are to talk about what happened. He has been back to talk again to Clement with the help of Benny Ceulaers as translator and Benny gave him his father's pen nib. Other artefacts unearthed by the group are stored and then taken to exhibitions they mount, many of them at airshows in the UK.

Benny had some other news for Chris. He'd informed Geel town council about the site and suggested they think about a memorial. There's no money, he was told, but later the message came through that money would be found from the 2014 budget, so Chris's next visit might be to the unveiling of a plaque bearing his father's name and the names of the rest of the crew.

What a fitting end to the story.
