Chinese lanterns: another lantern has been found in Quidhampton and a reader asked for it to be pointed out that if a lantern causes a fire or other damage and can be traced back to the person who released it that person is liable for the damage caused.

Dog fouling: it should be made clear that although dog fouling is a council and not a police matter it is illegal. On the spot fixed penalty notices can be given and offenders may be prosecuted and fined up to £1000. *Several people remarked how good it was that during the Jubilee celebrations there was no dog mess to be seen in Lower Road.*

Local people:

Bill West, world champion

As The Olympics draw closer it's surely time for an interview with Quidhampton's own world champion.

Newcomers may not realise that in Lock's Lane there lives a man with some astonishing achievements: powerlifter Bill West won 14 world championship titles and more than 20 world records, some still standing today. He performed at championship level for nearly thirty years and is the only man to win powerlifting world titles at 5 different body weights.

Bill told me his passion began in 1958, when he was 12, at a boys club on Milford Hill, Salisbury where he would leave the boxing and wrestling to watch what went on in the mysterious weights room. And he was hooked. He will never forget Charlie Plumb who encouraged him so much in the early days, even bringing weights over especially for him to use. It wasn't until he won his first British title in 1975 and qualified for the world championships that Bill had his own coach, very different to the way talented youngsters are looked after today. As a Junior he would train on his own all day but as time went on he and two other promising British lifters organised their own training four times a week.

The sport was new and the first official world championships were in 1973, the same year that Bill started his painting and decorating business which he has run ever since. "I was fed up asking for time off," he said. He won his first world championship in 1976, quite unexpectedly. He was selected for the team only after the first choice was injured but on the day his performance was best, and he ended equal with the US contender. Bill had the lighter body weight so he won. After that he got some local sponsorship, though again

nothing like the deals successful athletes have today.

As with any top level competitor his sport took over Bill's life completely but it gave him some incredible experiences. He travelled the world, loving it, especially the US where one of his early training buddies and lifelong friend now lives. Training and championship schedules always gave time for sightseeing. South Africa was interesting, he said, despite the compulsory bodyguards. Northern India was the most difficult experience; like many visitors he found the poverty overwhelming and hard to deal with.

Bill moved to Quidhampton in the late sixties when his parents took over the village shop and Post Office in 6 Alexandra Cottages. His

mother died in 1977 so lived to see him world champion, and his father died in 1982. Although he moved away Bill came back to the village in 2000 and says he loves the community centred round the pub (“We’re lucky to have it but it’s a case of use it or lose it.”). He enjoys quiz nights, the harvest auction, and the way everyone gets together for events like the Jubilee.

Powerlifting used to attract hundreds of spectators. It’s not (yet) an Olympic sport but Bill preferred it to the better known weight lifting because “it seems more natural than lifting weights over your head.” It’s also possible to lift heavier weights. The heaviest Bill lifted was 385 kilos which was a world record and which helped him win the world championship in 1991. Bill told me he never had an injury while lifting heavy weights – the moves are so carefully structured that you have to do it correctly. The only injury he sustained was when making a film for TV. He had to repeat a lift again and again with a light weight and got careless.

Bill’s powerlifting life has given him more memories and experiences than most people gather in several lifetimes. As well as the friendships and the travel he particularly treasures the time he was invited to a garden party at Buckingham Palace in 1992, the fortieth year of the Queen’s reign. The guests were sportsmen and women who’d been world champions during her reign. Bill was thrilled to meet the 1966 world cup team, Nigel Mansell and other famous personalities, as well as the Queen. When I said “You must have been so proud to have been there,” he told me that was exactly what the Queen had said.

Although the world championship categories extend to lifters of eighty years and above Bill decided to retire in 2004 and have ‘an ordinary life’. He can now go on holiday without first finding out whether there is a proper gym for daily training, he can indulge his other

sporting passion of fishing and he can do the things with family and friends that ‘normal’ people take for granted. He missed it terribly at first but last year he even gave up going to the gym.

When I asked what advice he would give to a young person starting out today he surprised me by saying he’d tell them to find another sport. Powerlifting, he explained, is one of the hardest. It takes years to build up your body before you can succeed. But Bill is an inspiring example of what someone can do – such a rich life full of achievement and now a happy retirement.

Powerlifting is not the same as weight lifting, though both involve lifting weights in three attempts.

There are three events:

Squat: the lifter stands erect, the bar loaded with weights resting on shoulders. At the referee’s command the lifter bends their knees and drops into a squatting position, then returns to an erect position. At the referee’s command the bar is returned to the rack.

Benchpress: With back resting on the bench and feet on the floor the lifter takes the loaded bar at arm’s length and lowers it to his or her chest. When the bar becomes motionless on the chest, the referee gives a press command and the lifter pushes the weight up until the arms are straight with elbows locked. At the referee’s command the bar is returned to the rack.

Deadlift: the lifter lifts the bar from the floor and stands upright with locked knees and shoulders back, the weight held by the lifter’s grip alone. At the referee’s command the bar is returned to the floor under control of the lifter.

Yes, another success. In fact the whole weekend received praise from visitors: “you are a very special group of people and it was lovely to be able to share this time with you all... your decorations are streets ahead of other villages”

And residents: “I am so proud of the village’s efforts for the Jubilee. Many villages are do-

ing nothing at all” “It will be a special memory for the children and let’s hope they do things like this for their children – and so it will continue.” Many people helped out including those who were away and offered parking spaces in

their driveways, and all the people who gave so many quality items for the hamper raffle prize that three hampers were made up. Others simply enjoyed it: “It was a fantastic weekend bank holiday, and a very well planned event. A big thank you to all those who put in such hard work for those like myself who just sat back and lapped it all up!!”

The core organisers, who worked very hard indeed as the expected numbers doubled, said that comments like this made it all worthwhile.

Will anyone alive today see another Diamond Jubilee? Barring accidents, probably not. But we hope the people of Quidhampton will never forget this one.

How did it compare to Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897?

Clarrie Price (1890 – 1996) who lived in Quidhampton until her early twenties wrote:

We kept Queen Victoria's Jubilee in grand style. A wonderful fete in the fields, climbing a greasy pole, chasing a greased pig, tug of war and many other kinds of sports. Children were given Jubilee Mugs, and I remember how pictures of our great Queen Victoria thrilled me.

Now that sounds fun! Clarrie would have been nearly seven. The school log book records that the school was closed on 21 and 22 June. The children were presented with a mug and plate from one donor in the morning and a mug from another in the afternoon. A third donor gave chocolate. Later 80 loaves were distributed among the poorest of the children.

The parish magazine describes other events: *"At quarter past ten a procession headed by the band and colours of the old Loyal Club paraded the village and marched to Fugglestone Church."* After a service the procession re-formed and *"accompanied by Morris dancers proceeded to the pasture grounds adjoining the Wilton Road, kindly lent and prepared for the occasion by Mr Taunton. At 12.30 a dinner was provided for all the men and women in the village, Mr Taunton presiding. After dinner sports and other amusements were indulged in and about ten o'clock all returned to their homes having thoroughly enjoyed themselves"*. (N.B. in Bemerton the men had a dinner while the women and children had a tea in the afternoon but there was no differentiation in Quidhampton)

Mr Taunton was the local farmer but does anyone know what the 'old Loyal Club' was?

We are not told how many people attended the festivities but the population of Quidhampton in 1901 was about 296 so the 300 who came to our street party may have been the largest number ever to sit down for a meal in the village. In 1897, however, Fugglestone inhabitants were included and if all 85 of them came that would have been the bigger gathering.

Further Parish Council matters from May meeting

Councillors on the Planning Group are Paul Cripps, Dave Roberts, Peter Strawson and Ken Taylor.

Jennifer Tyler continues to look after the recreation ground assisted by Pete Dawson Dave Roberts will attend WILCAP meetings and Ken Taylor will attend Area Board meetings.

There was discussion of the use of the marquee by villagers. Under the terms of the new insurance policy villagers can use the marquee but they must also have their own insurance for their event which must be shown to the parish council beforehand. The marquee should be put up and dismantled under the supervision of someone approved by the marquee committee.

New secure storage for the parish mower is required and it was agreed to buy a shed.
