Saving St John's Church : first major target achieved!



On 1 May the church was full, with a good number from Quidhampton, to hear about probably the last chance to save St John's from closure.

As outlined in the last newsletter the plans stand a real chance of succeeding with the school as main tenant. All homes in Quidhampton should have had a sample letter that can be sent to the planning authority in support : deadline 5 June. **The exciting news** is that £25,000 of the £100,000 needing to be raised by the community has been raised or pledged already! It will be used as match funding to add another £20,000 (to be confirmed at the end of May).

The target of £20,000 for the community to raise before the end of May was reached by the middle of May. Pledges: money that has been pledged will be called in when building starts. Rector Simon Woodley says: we have had so many pledges it is taking more time than we would like to write to you all individually. Thank you for being patient. Grants: a lot now depends on the success of grant applications. There have been a couple of disappointments but there are lots of irons in the fire. As Simon says: "More prayer or fingers crossed - whichever is your style!" Fundraising: the first event is Bemerton Open Gardens Sunday 15 June, always a pleasure to go to.

Annual Parish meeting

Seven villagers attended.

Village Reports

Entertainments Fund: John Cater reported that in 2013/14 the fund gave £160 to the fete for the band and £150 towards general costs for the bus pass party. There were no village events to increase the fund, the only income was its share of 100 Club profits. The fund is now £1963 compared to £2189 last year. Village Quiz : Howard Rowley reported that since the pub closed the monthly guiz has continued in the village hall. It is usually well attended. Costs are covered and between £30 - £45 is raised each time for a charity chosen by the winning team. Howard will continue to run it as long as it is successful.

Village Hall Committee: John Cater reported that plans to refurbish the kitchen had been agreed. £1248 will cover the cost of replacing the two small cookers with a large range cooker, and buying a stainless steel table, a portable water boiler and a larger fridge. A grant application has been submitted to the Area Board for £600 which leaves £648 matched funding to find. The committee asked the Parish Council to contribute to the cost.

Newsletter: Bea Tilbrook reported that the newsletter was produced as before, and was sadly more essential because of the closure of the pub. Sponsorship to cover the cost comes from the Parish Council and individuals. There is enough to pay for the next seven months and she has not had to ask for sponsorship for two years. Several villagers are donating for the second or third time and it is heartening to see people supporting the community in this way.

Flood warden: Ken Taylor reported that only gardens had flooded in the village. **Commemoration of World War One:** Bea Tilbrook reported that all men on the lych gate memorial had been identified

and would be commemorated in the newsletter and Bemerton's What's On 100 years after their death. Prayers would also be said in St Andrews. More Quidhampton survivors are being identified and some descendants have been traced, most notably descendants of Herbert and Arthur Case, and Robert and George East. Photographs and stories are being exchanged - very exciting! An incidental by-product is the collection and creation of resources e.g. tabulation of some of the information in the 1911 census: a list of names mentioned in the school log book of the time; Kelly's Street directories (Bea holds copies of one directory from each of the decades 1930's, 1950's 1960's and 1970's.) If anyone wants to use these for their own research please get in touch.

Other matters:

20 mph limit through the village: the application did not get to the next stage. There was some discussion about the way this decision was made and agreement that it seemed unfair. The chairman will write to the Area Board. Another application can be made next year. Community Speedwatch: the clerk will pursue this to see if we qualify Village Fete 13 September to include the Quidhampton Bake Off challenge: the Parish Council supports this. Finance: The accounts are healthy and the auditor's report was good. It was decided to meet the remaining cost of the improvements to the village hall kitchen, with a recommendation that refurbishment of the toilets be considered next.

Recreation ground: councillors will meet again to finish clearing the wild area. The bin in the playground: the Parish Council is now paying to have this emptied fortnightly.

Quidhampton's firework display did not take place last year and Howard explained

that it is too difficult to organise it without the pub which provides cooking facilities, electricity, toilets etc. Everyone hoped the pub would re-open in time for a display to be held this year and the Parish Council would support it if it did.

Quidhampton Parish Website: Paul Cripps explained that the website is consistently used with the Parish Council minutes being the most popular and the newsletter second. He has not got the time to maintain all aspects of it and Caroline Hampson volunteered to help. A quantity of salt for use in icy conditions is still held by the Parish Clerk. There was no call for it last winter.

Be Tick Aware

There may be more ticks this year because of the mild wet winter. Wiltshire Council warns:

Ticks are most commonly found in woodland and long grass. They are small spider like creatures whose bite can go unnoticed and they can spread Lyme disease. An unfed tick can be the size of a sesame seed on a burger bun, or even smaller : 2-3 mm

Be careful when walking in woodland or long grass and keep to paths.

Wear long sleeves and trousers tucked into socks.

Use insect repellent if particularly worried. Check for ticks when you get home on your body and your clothes. They love skin folds – armpits, backs of knees etc – and your hairline.

If you find a tick grip it as close to the skin as possible with fine tweezers and pull upwards slowly and firmly. Do not remove it by burning it or covering it with something like Vaseline. Apply antiseptic to the bite and keep an eye on it.

An early symptom of Lyme disease is a circular rash at the site of the bite. It develops between 3 to 30 days after the tick bite. There may also be flu like symptoms and more serious symptoms can develop later. Lyme disease is a bacterial infection that can usually be successfully treated with antibiotics.

A special St John's discovery : the grave of Clarrie Price

The editor writes: newer villagers may not know of my fascination with the Price family who moved here in 1890 and the research l've done into their lives. This was a family that came down in the world from auite prosperous beginnings because the father. Charles, preferred alcohol and gambling to work. In 1907 he emigrated to Canada to join his second son

but his wife, Clara, lived in Nadder Lane for 25 years and is buried at St John's.

Three of their nine children died when young but Clarrie Price, the second youngest, lived to be 105 by

which time she had no local family and was penniless. She did have, however, an unwavering Christian faith and a gift for life and friendship and many people in



Clarrie's grave is beside the cricket ground fence, directly behind the granite headstone of Murial Ivy Davis and in front of the silver birch.

Salisbury still remember her with pleasure. She was buried at St John's in 1996 but her grave was unmarked. When I gave a talk about the family eighteen months ago there was enthusiasm for the idea of some kind of commemoration of Clarrie's long life, and the lives of her three young sisters, also buried in unmarked graves at St John's. And now Clarrie's grave has been found! It was an emotional occasion with Ian Newman, funeral director, Rev Simon Woodley and Sue Amey, manager of Holmwood Residential Home where Clarrie spent the last years of her life. The surrounding graves all have gravestones so Clarrie's can be marked with one too, not just a flat memorial plaque as we imagined.
