White Horse Inn to re-open

It's the news we have all been waiting for! Enterprise Inns has succeeded in finding new landlords for The White Horse.

Zoe and Nick Hoare of Child Okeford get the keys on 9 July and will then redecorate the flat, test the new kitchen etc. They plan to open with a summery welcome evening on **Friday 1 August**. If they are ready before that they will open informally – watch out for details on flyers and notice boards outside the pub. They will open for coffee on the morning

of **Saturday 2 August** so anyone who wants to can have a chance to talk to them and discuss what they would like to see happen in the pub.

Zoe told the newsletter they want to make The White Horse a hospitable and

welcoming village pub with good quality traditional food. She will be a full time landlady while Nick will at first continue his work as a farrier during the day. They have a three legged dog called Pickle and 'an ancient cat'.

Zoe would like to thank the 'woman from Greenways Barn' who was so friendly and welcoming when she first visited.

There is a basic website where they are advertising for staff: chef/cook, kitchen assistant, part-time bar/waiting staff and part time cleaner.

Editor's comment: THANK YOU teachers! Looking at the list of activities on page one I was struck by how hard teachers work to make sure their pupils have a wonderful end to the school year: Leavers Service, music concerts, The Prom, activities week, staff v pupils sports, days out... I can remember nothing at all happening when I left my Junior school in 1959, and there was just a rounders match with staff at the end of my secondary school days. We've come a long way since then.

And not only do teachers make the last days memorable for pupils who are leaving. At the same time they carefully prepare the way for September's intake making sure their start at the school is as smooth as possible with parents evenings and induction days. I remember cycling alone across town one September morning aged eleven for my first day at a school I had never seen before. The good old days? In so many ways they were not.

Parish Council News

20mph limit: the application for a speed limit of 20 mph for Lower Road, Bemerton has succeeded in getting to the next stage and Quidhampton's case will be re-submitted next year.

Waste collections: Black bags: an update.

Rubbish bagged separately next to your household waste bin will not be collected and a green hanger/label will be left on the bin.

If you are finding it hard to fit all your rubbish in your bin you may be able to get an extra or larger bin if you meet any of the following conditions:

- you have a household of 3 or more children in nappies or
- you have 5 in your household, with 1 child in nappies or
- · you have 6 or more in your household or
- you have medical needs

You may have to have a waste audit before your request for an extra bin is approved and all households who have a larger bin will be subject to annual review (which may include a waste audit).

Special note: You may be able to reduce your food and garden waste by getting a subsidised food waste digester. Any waste from animals that do not eat meat such as chickens or pigeons can be recycled in a green Johanna or traditional composter. Contact Wiltshire Council for details of digester and extra or larger bin.

In Quidhampton: some households do not have black bins because they have no access for them. These households can continue to use black bags but will be sent official stickers to put on them.

Some people in Nadder Lane have received them already.

Lights Out Campaign:

The Royal British Legion, as part of the cultural programme **14-18 NOW**, is asking people to turn off their lights on **4 August** from 22.00 to 23.00 leaving only a single light or candle for a shared time of reflection. It will be one of the largest participatory events of its kind ever seen in the UK and will be at the same time as a candlelit vigil in Westminster Abbey.

On that night more than a million Commonwealth Service personnel who lost their lives in the war will be remembered.

The Royal British Legion hopes one million candles will be lit across the UK – a unique national moment. It echoes the famous words of Edward Grey, British Foreign Secretary, on the eve of war: The lamps are going out all over Europe; we shall not see them lit again in our life-time.

Commemorating those who died in the First World War

A brief account of the life of the first man from the parish to die 100 years ago as a result of the First World War appears this month. All the men whose names are on the St John's lych gate memorial will be commemorated in this way and prayers will be said for them in the service at St Andrews on the nearest Sunday to the anniversary of their death.

Some notes:

- The parish in this instance means Bemerton and Quidhampton. Fugglestone men are commemorated in Wilton.
- Names sometimes appear on more than one memorial. There were no national rules and local committees made the decision about who to include. Men might be commemorated where they grew up, where they or their parents lived at the time of their death, where they worked, went to school, or had a particular association
- Historical research is never finished and additional information is always welcome **Editor's note: design wanted**: Wendy Lawrence and I would love to have a simple drawing to use to symbolize the project, perhaps the lych gate and a poppy. Any offers?



William Charles Cake 1890 – 1914 : Sgt 1st Battalion Dorset Regiment

William Cake was killed on 24 August 1914, aged 23 and is commemorated at Hautrage Military Cemetery, Belgium. His battalion landed in France on 16 August and marched to Belgium. On 23 August, having withstood the much larger German army for 48 hours at the battle of Mons, the British began to retreat. The regimental diary for 24 August records 12 'Other Ranks' (not officers) killed, 69 missing and ends 'weather very fine and hot'. William had enlisted in the regular army in April 1907, after working as a cleaner on the railway in Salisbury for a year. He was only 16 but added two years to his age so the army would accept him. Records suggest his father, Henry Cake, did the same thing when he joined the Army Service Corps in the 1870s, breaking with his Dorset family's tradition of being farm labourers.

He later left the army, married and in 1891 was back in Dorset as a gamekeeper. In 1901 he was a town labourer on the roads in Salisbury and in 1911 a gardener living at 1 Church Cottages, Bemerton.

William Cake was born before the family left Dorset which could be why he joined the Dorset Regiment. While at Dorchester barracks he met Elsie Legg and they married in February 1914 in Belfast where his battalion was stationed. Their son Reginald was born in Dorchester in late July, just before William was promoted to sergeant and sent to France, ending their short married life.

He was killed on land that was in German hands for most of the war. Hautrage Military cemetery was begun by the Germans in August 1914 and more British graves were added after the Armistice but William's grave was not marked. In 1922 some of his personal effects were received from the German authorities and his wife wrote hoping this meant his grave could be found and expressing her desire to visit it but it has never been identified. A memorial bears his name and the words "Believed to be buried in this cemetery".

Elsie Cake lived in Dorchester with her parents until she re-married in 1934 and William Cake's name also appears on Dorchester's war memorial. His father and mother, Henry and Alice Cake, were still living in Bemerton in the 1930's, latterly in Hill Terrace, Lower Road.

William's two brothers also served in the army and will be featured in future newsletters.

William Cake will be remembered in prayers on Sunday 24 August at St Andrews Church at the 8 a.m. service.

- use the free garden waste collection service get a green bin from Wiltshire Council
- avoid lighting bonfires on windy days
- avoid damp days the smoke will hang around
