# A big thank you

Editor's note: I am sure I speak on behalf of everyone in thanking the newsletter deliverers once again for giving up their time to make sure people get their copy of the newsletter. The world isn't entirely digital and most Quidhampton residents seem to prefer the paper copy that drops through their letterbox at the beginning of the month.

If you would like to get the newsletter by email as well as through your front door just email the editor and your name will go on the list. Brian Overton of Coronation Square died in hospital on 3 November. The following is an edited version of the tribute that was read at his funeral.

Brian was born in 1943 in Salisbury, and spent his childhood in Windsor Street with his parents Dorothy and Edward and his brother and sister Allan and Jean. He also had an elder sister Margaret who lived away.

Brian started work at Moores shoe repairers in Salisbury and shortly after that met Phyllis Blake. They married in February 1965 and moved to Waterditchampton where he started a new job as a forestry woodsman on the Wilton Estate. He was also a part-time fireman in Wilton. Brian and Phyllis had five children: Tracey, Tania, Samantha, Julie and Daniel.

In 1974 they moved to Quidhampton, and Brian began work as a telephone engineer with British Telecom (then the GPO). He was there for many years and made lifelong friends.

Brian always had a great love of the sea and anything maritime. His children remember stories he told them of Frances Drake, Nelson and the Titanic. It was a tradition of his to take them into Salisbury market on a Saturday morning where they would have to endure a plate of cockles (with lots of vinegar) from the cockle man Peter Johnson. Peter retired several years ago but came to Brian's funeral, another example of the lifelong friendships he made.

He was a keen sea fisherman and spent many weekends on the choppy seas with his work pals. His children remember how they loved to watch him behead and gut his catch at the kitchen sink with his special fishing knife. He had extensive knowledge of underwater species and shipwrecks, a favourite being Portland Bill. Brian's marriage to Phyllis ended in 1986 and four years later he married Mavis. They enjoyed holidays together in



Cornwall and Devon and also trips abroad to Tenerife and Corfu and a couple of cruises. He still enjoyed sea fishing but was also happy spending time in the garden with the grandchildren of his extended family and the seven grandchildren from his first marriage: Luke, Natalie, Megan, Zachary, Chloe, Grace and Jacob. He was affectionately known to them as Grumpy Grandad. After taking early retirement from British Telecom at 50. Brian worked first as a part time warehouseman then ended his working days as a member of the housekeeping team at Salisbury District Hospital.

He never lost his love of the sea and would often be found listening to the shipping forecast on his computer. Brian was a real local and lived in the village for 42 years. That kind of life is rarer these days and perhaps communities are the poorer for it.

Editor's note: Brian thought a lot of his family and traced much of his family history, particularly his parents' and grandparents' generations. This was in the days before the internet so involved much energy and persistence travelling to different record offices and getting information by post. I always admired the effort he put into this. Researchers today have a much easier time of it.

### **Parish Council Matters**

At the meeting in November the following matters were discussed

- the problem of visibility on Wilton Road traffic and pedestrians, especially people who wait at the bus stops on the north side which is likely to be the responsibility of Network Rail.
- the new football nets will be put up.
- the precept for 2017/18 was set at the same level as 2015/16. It had been increased for this year (2016/17) to cover the cost of the 20 mph limit on Lower Road which is to be expected to be in place by the end of March 2017.
- the problems caused by faded yellow and white lines on the roads were discussed.
   This has been reported and is 'on the list'. Villagers are again asked to be considerate in parking, and to bear in mind the need of the bus to come through, especially at the Coronation Square end of Lower Road.
- New village noticeboard: this will be on the agenda of the next meeting


