Quidhampton Village Hall under threat

All homes in Quidhampton received a yellow leaflet explaining this in more detail.

After serious consideration Rev Simon

Woodley's view is **not** to renew the lease of the village hall in 2019 but to keep the site for church use.

Recent housebuilding, including Fugglestone Red 2, means the church parish is growing and more clergy accommodation and meeting places are needed.



Rev Woodley has said, however, that he would be prepared to reconsider if there was a "concerted and successful effort" to increase the use of the hall for the benefit of the Quidhampton community.

It is true that the hall has not been used very often for village purposes in recent years, although when the pub was closed the monthly quiz and Christmas concert were held there.

What can we do to keep the hall?

The success of the January exercise class shows people do want things to happen in the village, although the days of local clubs meeting in the hall every week or month may be over. (apparently that is a national trend).

So, if you think we should keep the hall, that it is a part of village life that helps bind the community together, why not:

- organise an event or hire the hall
 e.g. for a children's party or persuade a group you are involved with to hold a session there (both of these have happened recently)
- attend events that are put on at the hall
- show your support by coming to the public meeting on 19.00 on 15 February or send your apologies and views. It is important that the village hall committee know how many people support it.
- join the committee. It's not a lifetime's commitment but more help is needed this year and next to promote the use of the hall

Finance: this is not a financial issue. With the current fundraising or an increase in lettings the hall will break even. Grants are usually available for non-routine maintenance.

Next fund raising events: Milestone Marriages Saturday 8 April and Jumble sale Saturday 13 May. These events are not just to raise money: they are part of the social life of the village.

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Mark Walter 25 May 1949 to 21 December 2016

Salisbury Crematorium was full for the celebration of Mark's life. Maureen would like to thank all their Quidhampton friends who went, and those who sent her cards and messages of support. It has been a real help in dealing with his sudden death, she said. The autopsy revealed he died of a heart attack, a comfort because it would have been quick for him. Maureen also says she was overwhelmed that more than £500 was given in Mark's memory, with more to come from the funeral directors, but anyone listening to the tributes paid to him would not have been surprised. Mark was liked by everyone who knew him and made some very deep friendships. Again and again he was described as 'a very gentle soul, a true gentleman'.

Mark's life: His parents and their nine children moved from Hampshire to Salisbury when he was five. Mark went to St John's school at Bemerton and St Thomas's (in the town centre), then did a full time building course at Salisbury College. He met Maureen at Salisbury Fair. It was love at first sight; he wanted to marry her straightaway. Instead they started seeing each other, parted for a few months, got engaged at seventeen and married at nineteen.

Mark worked for Maureen's father learning the roofing business and became skilled in all aspects of the trade. He took the business over when his father-in-law retired in 1990. They were well known for quality and there are many examples of Marks' work here and abroad. He loved his work, especially restoring run down buildings, and was very conscientious, often doing extra bits without charge.

Maureen's memories: Mark was a happygo-lucky man, content with the simple things in life. He loved the countryside and the birds, especially birds of prey. A lifelong fisherman, he couldn't go past a river without looking in. He played the guitar

from the age of sixteen and loved entertaining the children with their requests. He also enjoyed watercolour painting but his main passion was cycling. We cycled all our life together. He followed all the top cyclists on TV and the highlight was going to the Tour de France on holiday last year.

Mark was like a ten year old on a bike with no fear. About a year ago we had a family trip with our bikes to the Isle of Wight and when we came to a steep descent everyone slowed down except Mark. With his feet off the pedals and hands off the brakes he sped down the hill. We were highly amused when the 30 mph speed limit flashed as he got to the bottom! He never lost his sense of adventure. Mark adored his family. He was a kind, gentle, wonderful husband, father to Naomi and Daniel and grandfather to Harrison, Marcus, Alfie and twins Louis and Luke. I feel so lucky that we shared so many happy years together.

In Quidhampton: Maureen and Mark lived here for two periods of their life, the first being at Sylvaine (now Hope House) in the 1970s. That was their first real home together and was when their children were born. In 1996 they returned to Braeview. Maureen has very fond memories of their last sixteen years here. She says in the seventies it was a less sociable village and the pub was for men only!

Maureen and Mark moved to Downton in 2012 where she has 'wonderful neighbours' who are helping her through this very difficult time.

Samara's Aid

Hannah Brown of Meadow Glen says she was delighted with the response to the appeal for good quality clothes and items for baby care packs for displaced people in the Middle East.

"I made up six baby care packs," she said, "and twenty six boxes of good quality used clothes and shoes for children and adults." She also collected one box of towels, two boxes of 'beautifully handknitted items' and three huge packing boxes of blankets.

"It's been quite a learning curve,' Hannah continues, "but I've really enjoyed it and feel like I'll be ready for the next appeal now I've learnt a thing or two.

I couldn't be prouder of our little community, especially as it was all pulled together in just over a month. Good news in these dark times. I think."

Thanks go to everyone in Quidhampton and Lower Bemerton who gave items and to individuals in Pewsey and Shrewton (and probably elsewhere) who get the newsletter by email and came here with generous donations.

Corrections

An H was added to Eve Warton's name, in the last newsletter, confusing her with another famous writer, American Pulitzer prizewinner Edith Wharton. You're not as famous as her yet, Eve, but who knows what the future may hold!

A more serious error was made in November in the account of the Cousins family and their involvement in the First World War.

The impression was given that Richard Philpott, grandson of George Cousins, had moved away but it is good to report that he is still living in Coronation Square.

WW1 casualty Herbert Castle will be remembered in St Andrews church on Sunday 5 March 100 years after his death . **See his story following on p8**The next serviceman to be commemorated, William Hayter, was killed on 9 April 1917 and he will be remembered at St Andrews on Sunday 9 April. His full biography will appear in the April/May newsletter which will be published later that week.

Herbert Castle 1879 – 1917 Able Seaman Royal Navy

Herbert Castle joined the navy in 1895 and was in the reserves in August 1914 so he was called up immediately. In May 1916 he was discharged with TB and died in Bemerton on 1 March 1917, aged 37.

Family History

Herbert's father, John Castle, was from a family of farm labourers in Ebbesborne Wake, in the remotest part of the Chalke Valley. Many people were moving away from that life for alternative employment but John was the only one of his siblings to do it successfully. One of his sisters was a servant in London before returning to marry a shepherd, and his brother also tried his luck there but ended up in the workhouse.

In 1851 John Castle was eighteen and still a farm labourer in Ebbesbourne Wake but before 1863, when he married Caroline Abbott, he had made the break with farm work. They married in St Paul's, Fisherton, and both were described as 'attendants at the asylum'. This is particularly remarkable because in 1861 John was an inmate there. Caroline's family were farm labourers from Berwick St John. One of her siblings became a postmaster and another a publican, both on the Isle of Wight.

Two years after their marriage John and Caroline were in Hampshire where John was a gamekeeper but they had returned to Salisbury by 1871 when he was again an attendant at Fisherton Lunatic Asylum. They lived in West End Cottages, Wilton Road, the future home of another of our men, Thomas Trubridge, whose father also worked at the asylum, and whose mother was Caroline Castle's sister.

In 1881 John became the licensee of the Wilton Arms and was publican there until his death in 1904, aged 72. The Salisbury Times wrote about this as the "Death of an Old Sportsman: he was widely known as an excellent shot with the gun and his funeral was largely attended by his friends."

It was a long way from being a farm

labourer in a remote village, but sadly John had succumbed to a hazard of his new profession and died of cirrhosis of the liver.

Herbert's siblings

John and Caroline had eight children, and two who died in infancy. Herbert, the second youngest, was only eleven in 1890 when his mother died.

As soon as they were old enough all six of the surviving daughters - Rosina, Maud, Kate, Mabel, Georgina, and Winifred - started work as servants in private houses or hotels, some locally, others in Wardour and Rochester. Mabel was a nurse in Bethnal Green Lunatic Asylum, London, and in 1903 married another of our servicemen, Frank Goodyear, of the 10th Royal Hussars. After her mother's death Rosina returned to help run the Wilton Arms. Reginald's only brother, Aquila, had worked there but no records have been found for him after 1891.

Life in the navy

Herbert Castle joined the navy when he was sixteen, and in 1897, when he was eighteen, signed on for twelve years. He served on a variety of ships and shore establishments at Portland and Portsmouth and spent three years each on two pre-dreadnaught battleships: HMS Prince

George, part of the Channel Fleet, and HMS Ramillies, the flagship of the Mediterranean fleet where he was promoted to able seaman.

In 1903 when Ramillies returned for a refit Herbert was re-assigned to shore establishments. In April 1905 he transferred to the Royal Fleet Reserve for the rest of his engagement at the end of which he re-enrolled as a reservist until 31 August 1915.

The reason why Herbert to transferred to the reserves cannot now be known. He returned to Salisbury and probably lodged at 14 St Andrews Road with his sister Mabel and her husband. Frank, now a clerk. His other sisters had left Salisbury: Rosina was on the Isle of Wight working at her aunt and uncle's pub, Maud had died of TB leaving a husband and two young children. Kate was housekeeper to a surgeon in Broadchalke, and Georgina and her husband Harry Alford were housekeeper and butler at Swallowcliffe Mill. Winifred, who married immediately after the death of their father. was in Shrewton with her husband Arthur Brown, army pensioner and labourer. By 1911 Mabel and Frank Goodyear had moved to Aylesbury where Frank was an RSPCA inspector. Herbert, aged 32, was a wood sawver and boarded at 57 Windsor Street, Fisherton, a household with strong military connections. His landlord had served in the Dragoon Guards and two soldiers from Greenwich were also boarding there.

Herbert was called up on 2 August 1914

and served for nearly two years in the inhospitable North Sea. For over a year he was on HMS Patuca patrolling the Shetlands. On 4 May 1916 he was 'invalided' with TB and returned to Salisbury knowing he would probably die within months. He moved into 3 Bright's Villas, Skew Bridge Road, two doors away from where his sister Georgina was then living, and died there on 1 March 1917. Herbert is buried in Devizes Road cemetery, his unusual gravestone reflecting his love of the sea.

There is no acknowledgement of any cause or aggravation of his TB by his war service so his name is not on the Commonwealth War Graves roll of honour. Herbert Castle is remembered as a victim of the First World War only at St John's.

Continuing Family History

Georgina was not the only one of Herbert's sisters to return to the Salisbury area. By 1918 Mabel and Frank Goodyear were living at 2 Bright's Villas. Later the widowed Mabel moved to Shrewton with her daughter Dorothy, a teacher. Dorothy married George Ferdinando, the uncle of Glenna Ferdinando who lived Bemerton until last year.

After the death of her aunt and uncle on the Isle of Wight, Rosina also moved to Shrewton, as did Kate.

Georgina and her husband, Harry Alford, lived in Skew Bridge Road until their deaths in the 1930s.

Winifred and Arthur Brown, who had no surviving children, settled on the Clarendon estate. Only Mabel and Maud had grandchildren. Maud's husband, Samuel Jennings, became a successful builder who re-married and lived briefly in Bemerton where their children were baptised, but settled in Harnham.

Parish Council meeting January 2017

Vice-chairman Howard Rowley was in the chair

<u>Parish Precept</u> At the last meeting the council agreed a precept of £57.19 for a band D house, which is a slight decrease on the current year when money was needed for the 20 mph limit. This means there will be funds for new equipment for the playground, a new noticeboard and footpath maintenance. The parish precept is the part of your council tax that goes to the parish council.

Traffic issues

20mph speed limit

Councillors felt that some traffic had slowed down but some had not, particularly during the quieter times of day. It was felt more signs would be a good idea and the clerk will look into buying adhesive 20 mph signs to go on wheelie bins. This was agreed to be an effective move because they would be a reminder on one or two days a week which is apparently noticed more than something that is there all the time.

Community Speedwatch: an up-to-date metrocount has to be taken before speedwatch can be considered and the parish clerk was asked to request this.

Inconsiderate parking: this is still a problem in some parts of the village and can be reported to Chris Edge, chairman (07790564735 cedge482@gmail.com)

Re-painting of road markings: the clerk continues to chase this up

<u>New Parish Noticeboard</u> Councillors were invited to bring specific ideas and photos or diagrams to the next meeting. It was agreed that the two existing postholes would have to be used and that any village resident who wished to quote for the work should be encouraged to do so.

- have occupied any land or other premises here for 12 months up to the election or
- your main place of work is and has been here for 12 months or
- you have lived here for 12 months up to the election

N.B. You will not qualify if you are subject to bankruptcy restrictions or have had a prison sentence in the last five years.
