## William Charles Hugh Curtis 1887 - 1917

Corporal William Curtis of the First Battalion, Wiltshire Regiment, was killed in action in Belgium on 11 June 1917, aged thirty. He is buried in Wulverghem-Lindenhoek Road Military cemetery near Ypres. Prayers will be said for him in St Andrews church on Sunday 11 June.

#### **Family history**

The Curtis family came to Quidhampton from East Dorset in the 1850's, when William's grandfather, carpenter Charles Curtis, moved here, perhaps to join the Tabor carpentry business.

The youngest two of Charles's seven children, Frederick Charles and Nathaniel, were born in Quidhampton but the family was living in Bemerton by 1871. Frederick Charles (William's father) became a bricklayer and married carpet factory worker, Mary Anne Carpenter, in 1880. They had fourteen children, one of whom died in infancy. After a short period in Fisherton, they lived in Bemerton for the rest of their lives.

#### William's life

Their fifth child, William, known as Bill, was born at 4 Bath Terrace, Wilton Road in 1887. Bill's parents moved house many times, from Gorringe Road to Church Lane, to Wilton Road, Lower Road and St Andrew's Road. The children went to Bemerton School where Emily, the oldest, was chosen for the Park School when she was nine.

The Pembroke family founded the Park School in 1838 with the aim of 'clothing and educating 35 poor girls'. Lady Pembroke or her daughter visited Bemerton School every year to choose girls for the school. Later there were times when not enough girls wanted to go, perhaps because the school seemed to prepare its pupils specifically for domestic service. By then many young women preferred to work in factories or shops. The school closed in the early 1920's. Emily was a housemaid at a boarding school in Surrey and at Little Durnford House. At least seven of Bill's ten surviving sisters became maids when they left school. Bill probably never forgot the funeral of his uncle Nathaniel Curtis, a railway porter killed in an accident at work in 1899 when Bill was twelve. He had worked at the station for twenty years and his funeral was held on Sunday afternoon so everyone could attend. The local paper had a detailed description, including the crowds who gath-

ered at their home in Gorringe Road and processed to St John's behind the cortege. The mayor and stationmasters of Salisbury and Wilton were there with a section of the county police in attendance.

The Curtis family took an active part in parish life. Bill was a member of the Church Lads Brigade, first as a corporal then sgt bugler. He played in their football team and when he was sixteen took part in a popular 'tea and entertainments' event in the Mission Room (Quidhampton Village Hall) performing "The Ghost", a dialogue with Ernest Waters.

#### Work

Bill first worked as an assistant gardener, then for Great Western Railway and then as a bricklayer for Tabor whose business had expanded to include building work. During this time Bill may have been waiting for a different job, perhaps inspired by his uncle's funeral for, in 1907, as soon as he was twenty, he applied to join the Metropolitan Police.

For this a man had to be between twenty and thirty-five, at least five feet nine inches tall, physically fit, literate and of good character. Indiscipline and drunkenness were not tolerated and there were many dismissals and resignations. Bill was successful and was assigned to Chelsea where he stayed for eight years, suggesting he was happy and the work suited him. He left to join the army in June 1915.

Volunteering may have been a less straightforward decision for Bill than for many others: he was already doing a vital job, and the Metropolitan Police Force was responsible for several military establishments. Yet he clearly felt he ought to fight for his country and came back to his birthplace to enlist in the Wiltshire regiment.

#### Life in the army

The fit and disciplined policeman would have been a very welcome recruit. He probably began active service in January 1916 joining the First Battalion when they were out of the front line training in Belgium. Walter Smart, whose parents lived in Church Lane, was there too.

In March they moved south for mining operations at the front. Casualties increased and in May came their longest period in the trenches without relief: 21 days. Other troops were moving toward the Somme and 1st Wilts followed for an attack at Theipval on 4 July. Severe losses continued until mid-September when they withdrew to be in reserve. Walter Smart died on 2 September. In October they were sent to Ploeasteert. near the Belgian border, and settled into a routine of six days in the trenches, six days in support, six days in the trenches again and then six days in billets often interrupted by maintenance work in the trenches. Sometimes there were two weeks of training. Reinforcements arrived regularly, mainly inexperienced conscripted men. Writing after the war Lt White described those trenches as peaceful compared to the Somme, but deep, always muddy, rat infested and pervaded with the smell of rotting corpses. Officers would hitch a ride to a nearby town when they were in billets. In early June preparations began for a big attack on Messines Ridge, five miles south east of Ypres. At 03.10 on 7 June mines were exploded and an intensive artillery bombardment began. 1st Wilts moved off at 03.40, before it was light. They gained around and on 8 June dug a new trench -

their artillery barrage having destroyed the old one. On 9 June they took over a different section and were relieved in the evening of 11 June. 148 prisoners were captured and 7 machine guns taken, but 38 men had been killed and over 100 wounded. Bill Curtis, by then a corporal, was killed on 11 June and buried in a small cemetery that was later abandoned. In 1919 the bodies were taken to Wulverghem-Lindehoek Road cemetery. Unlike others, the cross on Bill's grave was intact so he was identified and has a named grave.

A memorial service was held in Westminster Abbey in May 1919 for the men of the Metropolitan Police Force who died in the war. Members of the royal family were there as well as prominent members of the legal profession.

#### Subsequent family history

Bill's father died in 1920 and his mother in 1940. Four of Bill's siblings stayed in Wiltshire and contact has been made with Janice, the widow of David Enticott and their daughter Wendy. David was the son of Bill's sister Lillian and William Enticott, an engine driver, also of Bemerton. David was brought up at 61 Lower Road, sang in the church choir and attended the local history society before he died in 2007. He was buried near his uncle Nathaniel's grave, the latest of seventeen Curtis family burials at St John's spanning 135 years.

The publication of this account has been paid for by Charles Frank who lives opposite the site of Tabor's Yard where Bill worked.

# Annual Parish meeting 17 May 2017

Chris Edge, the retiring chair, welcomed 10 members of the public to the meeting. **Community reports** were presented from organisations and events connected to the village, too many to be reported here.

**Other business:** Ron Smith raised the issue of the 20 mph limit and how often it is broken. It would be interesting to know the experience of other areas with a new 20 mph limit. The parish clerk reported that Speed Indicator Devices will be discussed by the Area Board.

Pauline Church, the newly elected Wiltshire Councillor for Wilton and the Wylye Valley, introduced herself. She is vice chair of the South West Wiltshire Area Board, and has, since the meeting, been appointed Portfolio Holder for Children's Safeguarding.

# Annual Meeting of the Parish Council

The newly elected councillors took their places: Viv Bass, Paul Cripps, Howard Rowley, Ken Taylor. Apologies were accepted from Zoe Hoare and Sallie Davies. Howard Rowley was elected chair, Paul Cripps vice chair and Charles Frank joined the council on being co-opted.

There are two more vacancies which can be filled by co-option. Contact the parish clerk if you would like to be a part of the council and have your say in what goes on in the village. Howard Rowley was appointed highways and parish steward link, Ken Taylor Area Board attendee and floodwarden, Paul Cripps website coordinator, Viv Bass dementia champion.

Among the items discussed:

**20 mph limit adhesive stickers:** these will soon be available from the White Horse or 2Quidy Club. They are intended for wheelie bins put out on Lower Road. **Quidhampton Recreation Ground:** designs for a pirate ship or a spider frame were circulated. A grant application will be made to the Area Board and money has been earmarked in reserves and rolled over for this. There may be other grants available – to be investigated. Only one football net has been put up to deter teams of young men who used the pitch in the past.

**Village Hall**: a draft proposal to register the village hall as an asset of community value was endorsed and will be submitted. (the pub was registered a few years ago).
