Defibrillator now installed behind the White Horse

Defibrillator

The Quidhampton defibrillator has been installed by the back door of the White Horse, in a locked cabinet for safety. If you need to use it call 999 to get the code to unlock it.

There are instructions by the defibrillator and information on how to use it will be circulated to every home. It is very straightforward to use. The machine talks you though what to do step by step. There is also a video on the internet showing one being used. (That one is not in a locked cabinet.)

www.heartsafe.org.uk/how-an-aed-works Everything you need will be with the machine.

The Parish Council is very grateful to Scottish and Southern Electricity Network for a grant for the defibrillator from their Community Resilience Fund. And the village is very grateful to the three parish councillors who organised it: Viv Bass, Fiona West and Mandy Whelan. Thanks also to Zoe and Nick Hoare who agreed (indeed were delighted) to have it on the wall of the pub.

Please make every effort to watch the video. If you do not have a device on which to watch it ask a friend or family member to show it to you on their phone. Training will be held in the village hall when restrictions allow.

Speed Indicator Device for Quidhampton

At their meeting on 25 August Quidhampton Parish Council agreed to buy a SID, a roadside Speed Indicator Device that shows drivers how fast they are going.

Sandie Smith, tireless and enthusiastic leader of Quidhampton Community Speedwatch (CSW), says:

"Lower Road is a rat run and always will be until Churchfields is relocated. Meanwhile villagers have to contend with many drivers exceeding the speed limit, with scant regard for pedestrians, runners, cyclists and even other drivers.

The SID will be used to reduce speeding in Lower Road and on the B3094 Netherhampton Road. As well as displaying the speed of a

vehicle coming towards it SID records a lot of other data that will help us show officials exactly how much traffic comes by and through the village and how fast it goes."



Commitment to buy

Howard Rowley, chair of the Parish Council, adds: "SID is part of a series of measures being pursued to make the village safer from speeding traffic. The data will help inform the police of the best times to provide effective support to the CSW team, and will be published on the Quidhampton Parish Council website."

SID won't be here immediately; there is a delivery time and the Highways Agency must approve the sites where it will be installed. But this decision is what many see as the most important step to make the village safer. Costs total \pounds 2400 including posts.



Bug house weekend event

On the last Friday and Saturday in August 24 children of various ages enjoyed making bug houses in The White Horse garden. Organiser Mandy Whelan prepared tins that when filled with bamboo canes became somewhere insects may hibernate. They also learned about solitary bees who do not live in shared nests like hives and who might nest in

Community email catch up

Information from August's community emails that is still relevant, not mentioned elsewhere and does not depend on an internet connection. If you want to join the community email send your email address to the editor (details back page)

Message from the Covid-19 support group: take care with hand gel / sanitisers. First: washing your hands regularly with soap and water is the best thing to do. Only use sanitisers when you cannot wash your hands.

- There is alcohol in hand gels so keep them out of the reach of children. Some brands are now made with an unpleasant taste but it is safest to put all hand gels where children cannot get them.

- Use only a small amount and always rub your hands together until they are dry. There have been a small number of cases of burns when gel coated hands came into contact with a heat source such as a gas ring or static electricity soon after sanitising. - try not to leave bottles of gel in direct sunlight particularly in a car.

Two important messages from the Covid-19 support group

1. If you arrive in the UK you may have to quarantine (self-isolate) for 14 days, whether you live here or are a visitor.

If you are in a household with possible or confirmed coronavirus you must also self isolate.

The rules are stricter than those under lockdown and no-one in the above categories should leave their home, even for exercise.

Help is available. The village volunteers will do your shopping, collect prescriptions and do other tasks (within reason!). Call the support group as before:

2. Getting a test for coronavirus

If you have symptoms or have been asked to have a test and have problems using the internet call 119. There is a testing centre at the Beehive park and ride near Old Sarum or you may be able to administer it yourself at home. If other people you live with have symptoms you can order tests for up to three of them.

The main symptoms are: high temperature, a new continuous cough and a change in your sense of smell or taste. You may not have all these symptoms. You can get advice from NHS 111.

From the Horse's mouth Zoe Hoare, landlady of the White Horse writes:

CORONAVIRUS RESTRICTIONS

Due to the ongoing social distancing requirements and Covid-safe trading restrictions, we're still restricted to a **maximum 2 households (or support bubbles) per table** indoors. **Outdoors, we can host groups of up to 6 people**. We know this is restrictive, but these are the rules we must observe.

As ever, booking is required, and some menus will require a pre-order to guarantee dish availability.

Looking out for each other

Looking for furze-pigs by Nick Tomalin

I have long wanted to write about hedgehogs (or furze-pigs!) and intended to do that in autumn when they are fattening up for hibernation, and piles of leaves and bonfire stacks are perfect places for them. So I was delighted when one August night I saw a hedgehog outside my house! It was the first one I had seen here, though neighbours said that they have frequent hedgehog visitors to their gardens.

Then imagine my surprise when I spotted my second the following night! This one scampered across the road

near the postbox, and dashed for cover before I could spend any time watching it. When I was young I used to sit at my window at night and watch up to four hedgehogs in the street. Gradually the numbers dropped and a hedgehog became a rare sight. These days it's very rare indeed, so I am thrilled to find they are making use of our garden. The population decline has been significant nationally, but there are a few simple things that we can do to help.

What to look out for in September Hedgehogs obviously! You may be lucky enough to have regular visitors in your garden, or see them crossing the road, or even see the sad remains of a flat hog. On an evening walk after dark watch out for a scampering hog, or stand silently in your garden and you might hear tell-tell rustling in the undergrowth.

What can you do to help? If you want to leave food out for hedgehogs, use meat-based cat or dog food, cat biscuits or specially made hedgehog food. Avoid bread which is not good for them and give only water to drink, never milk - they are lactose intolerant.

Where are the hedgehogs in the village?

If we know where hedgehogs are we can work out whether we have a healthy population, and perhaps target areas to encourage them.

If you're happy to share your records then please report any hedgehog sightings to me at nicetouch14@hotmail.com, giving your name, the location of the hedgehog (an address or grid reference), the date (can be rough if it was a while ago) and any details of your observations (was it alive or dead, just one or a pair, what it was doing etc).

Can you identify this cat?

Audrey Catford asks if anyone knows anything about a cat who has happily roamed at the back of Wylye Close for at least two years but recently seemed to be very hungry and went after her food for the first time. She says it is very pretty, mostly white but with darker markings that are not quite tortoiseshell nor exactly tabby on its back. Contact the editor if you can help. A resident of Sovereign Close says it is so much safer to get into Lower Road since traffic cones were left by the workers who painted the postbox and thanks people for not parking so close to the corner. At the western end people continue to park on double yellow lines which makes congestion worse. **VJ Day 15 August** Sadly Covid-19 regulations and increased traffic meant it was impossible to mark the 75th anniversary of the end of the second world war with a village gathering but it was good to see some houses with their own tributes, notably Jackie Peters at the east end of the village whose father, like the editor's, was in Burma on that day. Her father was a prisoner and in 2016 his granddaughter Zoe cycled 217 miles in Burma in his memory to raise money for Help for Heroes.

Congratulations to Archie Young who was awarded the A level grades he needed to get to Loughborough, his first choice university, as was Graham and Elizabeth Heeley's grandson, Sam Maddock, who is going to Warwick. It has been a tough time like no other for these students and they deserve to do well after all the uncertainty.

Trees at the junction of Raceplain

Road and the A3094. Over the last few years, Wilton Estate has undertaken various tree surgery works to the mature trees on the triangle on safety grounds. However, several trees have deteriorated substantially and a recent survey indicated that, unfortunately, the best course of action is to fell them, with the intention of replanting.

As the trees are surrounded on all sides by roads there is a major safety

issue. Wilton Estate spoke to Wiltshire Council and the Forestry Commission about the proposed work, which recently began and has been timed so that the field behind can be used to drop the timber into.

There will be a temporary closure of the slip road during the work. The area will be replanted with low storey trees and shrubs.
