Margaret Hutchins 1930 - 2020

Mum was born in Laverstock, the youngest of six. She lost a brother at an early age but kept in very close contact with her four sisters. She lived in and around Salisbury all her life, the furthest away being in Codford. She helped my Dad with his property business and also did the paperwork for his car parts business on Southampton Road (Contact which is now the carpet shop).

In her spare time she liked her garden including her greenhouse, walking the dog and she volunteered for many years at Abbeyfield House where she would go in weekly to make the residents their tea.

Mum was very family orientated. Unfortunately about 20 years ago we lost my brother Simon to a car accident and with a subsequent family break up she did not get to

see his children grow up. This was very difficult for her;

however she had a great relationship with my children Rachael and Thomas. They educated her in takeaway meals, facebook and computers and much more.

We moved to Quidhampton in 2011 as a family. When I was a child we lived at Cricket Field house, now the large hotel on Wilton Road.

Mum suffered with ill health for many years and although she looked glowing she had many issues but it did not stop her living life to the full. She had two rides in an air ambulance: one for a fractured spine and then, a few years ago, she and I were airlifted

off Lundy Island as she was seriously ill with a chest infection and sepsis.

As I worked and was out all day I arranged with Zoe for mum to have her main meal at the pub every day at lunchtime. She enjoyed meeting people and finding any gossip to bring home and tell us. Zoe would make sure she was ok and I knew she was looked after well. Mum was a keen member of the WI and enjoyed meeting up with the local ladies.

As she became frailer she was unable to visit the pub so we arranged for Katie Emmett, a local carer from the village, to be with mum. This started with Katie cooking her tiny meals fit for sparrow and developed into trips to Mudeford to walk along the quay, making Christmas puddings, cakes, and her favourite fair nuts. After a trip out she usually had a tale to tell about her day.

We really hope you enjoyed the flowers we put on our wall following her funeral. They were so beautiful we wanted to share them with everyone.

We would like to thank everyone for the cards and flowers that we received following her passing on 5th October. We had so many from the village, thank you.

Many villagers will miss Margaret. She was always interesting to talk to and one of the reasons I'd go to the pub for lunch – I knew there would be good company there.

Conservationist Nick Tomalin's regular column is not about birds this month. At the moment other things are more important.

Remember, remember....

It's that time of year when pumpkins, fireworks, and bonfires are at the front of many of our minds. Sadly, much of the usual joy of Halloween and bonfire night will be lost amid the current restrictions but there could be some good things as a result.

We know fireworks frighten pets so imagine what they do to wildlife. Studies show stress levels in wild animals are higher during firework displays. The same is true for some people, especially those suffering from PTSD. And fireworks themselves cause air pollution and release chemical toxins.



Remember too that many hedgehogs will be preparing to hibernate at the base of bonfires.

Firework displays and roaring bonfires are as much a positive part of children's upbringing as the natural world. I have been stunned by amazing displays I've seen in the past (particularly from the bar at the Shard in London one year!), **so enjoy Halloween and**

Bonfire Night, but make sure you check your bonfires for sheltering animals before *lighting them,* and please consider animals, domestic and wild, when planning home events.

What to look out for in November? Dog poo! I've seen more of it recently than in previous months. I wonder why. Perhaps our dog population is increasing. Perhaps dogs are being walked more frequently or are inexplicably more likely to defecate during October. Maybe dog owners get cold hands picking up after them, and so are more likely to leave it lying when the weather turns.



What can you do this month? Pick up after your dog! I am continually having to guide my toddler around piles of the stuff, even in the playground. You can't assume that, because it isn't right in the middle of the footpath small children won't go towards it. I can't believe any dog owner doesn't know when their hound answers the call of nature, so please pick it up and don't leave it there for others to find.

This month's winter recipe, sent in by Clare Herring who says it is adored by her daughter, Rosa.

Paprika spiced potatoes with apple

500g potatoes, skin on, cut into chunks 300g Jerusalem artichokes or any other root vegetable Oil for roasting 1 tsp. caraway seeds 2 tsp. each of coriander seeds, cumin seeds and sweet paprika 4 tsp. smoked paprika Pinch of dried chilli flakes 1 dessert apple, skin on, cut into eighths. Parsley to garnish Heat oven 180C/160C fan/Gas 4 Place potatoes and other veg. in roasting tray, drizzle generously with oil. Sprinkle generously with salt and scatter the spices. Toss well to coat.

Roast for 50 minutes, then add apple wedges and return to oven until everything is crispy and cooked. 10- 20 minutes.

Garnish with parsley, and serve with garlic mayonnaise.

It's great with sausages or chicken pieces or just on its own as a snack

Quidtips in the November Garden by Duncan

The clocks have gone back, the evenings draw in, the rain and wind seem relentless. At this time of year I often think of the poem November by nineteenth century poet Thomas Hood:

No sun - no moon! No morn - no noon No dawn - no dusk - no proper time of day. No warmth, no cheerfulness, no healthful ease, No comfortable feel in any member -No shade, no shine, no butterflies, no bees, No fruits, no flowers, no leaves, no birds! -No-vember!



I couldn't disagree more! The colours are stunning at the moment and on a bright day the low sunshine penetrates the leaf canopy of trees and shrubs lighting them like a stained glass window. The colours melt from green and gold to orange and red.

Look at the ivy in flower now, teeming with bees, wasps and all manner of insects. Late flowers are still in evidence and some fruit trees still heavily laden. Berries iglow on the branches, an all-important feast for the blackbirds, thrushes and their incoming migrant cousins.

In my garden greenfinches, chaffinches and sparrows are showing themselves again, taking turns at the birdfeeders, while blue tits, great tits, and coal tits make fleeting visits to grab a sunflower seed, and retreat swiftly to the bushes and safety.

Listen carefully and you may hear the distinct twittering sounds of long tailed tits, often in family groups of ten or twelve. They descend on the fat balls and disappear as quickly as they arrived.

Keep calm, relax and continue to enjoy Autumn!
