#### Christmas 2020 in Quidhampton A message from the village Covid support group

**We are now in Covid-19 risk category Tier 2 and the rules are stricter.** We can go to the White Horse for a meal but only with members of our household and we cannot socialise with other customers or invite people into our homes. It is tough but there are more cases locally and the need to be careful is stronger than ever.

#### Christmas 2020 will be very different.

Whether you decide to stay here, or have no choice about it (perhaps your family has to isolate) there will be more people in the village this year who are on their own, as they have already been on their own for many months.

And all the traditional events when people can get together have been cancelled. So, it is time to be a good neighbour as never before and look out for those around you. A friendly word, an unexpected gift, a slice of cake can make a big difference.

### Nick Tomalin's birding column: Five Gold Rings?

In November two villagers spotted a dead swan in the river at the west edge of Boyeswood. One managed to haul it onto the bank and found it had a metal ring attached to its leg.

Metal rings have been attached to birds' legs for over 100 years, each with a unique code that allows the bird to be identified. Information from the scheme tells us where birds go, how far they travel, and how long they live. The oldest known bird is a female albatross, estimated to be five years old when tagged in 1956. She was confirmed still breeding in 2019, making her nearly 70!

It was both sad and beautiful to see this magnificent swan up close, its feathers still gleaming white. The ring number was reported, and we learned it was ringed as a chick in August 2011 at Upton Lovell, around 19km west. I have no idea if that is a long or short way for a swan to move in 9 years.

What to look out for in December? Actually, what to listen out for: robins! You'll see many robins on Christmas cards. Their association with Christmas has been linked to the red breast matching the uniform of postmen, as well as the fact that they are seen in our gardens over the festive period. This is because they are one of the few species to keep a territory all year round, so they will stay to fight, sing and display through the winter. Keep an ear out for their melodic songs to brighten a crisp winter's day.

What can you do this month? Pop a tennis ball in your pond. The movement helps prevent the water from freezing when temperatures drop, which protects fish or amphibians. If it does freeze over, you can push the ball through, creating a breathing hole for any residents. A plastic bottle weighted at one end would do a similar job! *Editor: it was not clear why the swan had died; there were no wounds or signs of illness.* By the next day foxes had dragged the body further into the wood and begun to eat it. White feathers are all that remain now.

From the Horse's mouth. Landlady Zoe Hoare writes:

**Covid -19 restrictions** Wiltshire is now in the Tier 2 risk category which means you cannot socialise with people outside your household or support



bubble. It also means we cannot take bookings from more than one household, nor serve alcohol unless you are eating a 'substantial meal'. *This should be either a main course, or light snack (such as a starter) with a side dish, per person.* 

#### Support bubble: government guidance Important note from Quidhampton Covid-19 group

A support bubble can be made between a <u>single person household</u> and one other household of any size. It therefore cannot be with two grandparents but it can include any children under 18 who live with the single adult. You are then all are treated as a single household. You cannot change who is in your bubble once it is made. Please keep to this guidance at all times, including in the White Horse, for the safety of all customers and staff.

Support bubbles were created to help adults who live alone and should not be confused with childcare bubbles or Christmas bubbles.

While this news is a blow, it's not entirely unexpected. We plan to re-open from **Thursday 3 December** with the same precautions in place as before: a one-way system through the pub, hand sanitiser at the door, masks worn when not eating or drinking and of course, using the Test & Trace barcode with your smartphone where possible.

**Sloe Gin Competition:** we hoped to hold the competition in a distanced style between Christmas and New Year but, with Tier 2 restrictions, it is now postponed until January. Details in the next newsletter.

**2021 Burns Night Supper:** there may not be dancing, but there will be bagpipes, whisky and haggis! Distanced Burn's Suppers will be held on Friday 22 *and* Saturday 23 January. There will be a traditional supper of haggis, neeps and tatties along with a wee dram, and Liv McLennan will be piping on both nights. As always, book soon to guarantee a table as distancing means fewer tables and limited availability. Price £16 per head.

**Christmas Menu**: this has been adapted, due to the seasonal restrictions. Previously available by pre-order only, as a set 2 or 3 course meal, we have now incorporated the dishes into the main menu and specials board, along with regular pub favourites.

They can't wait to get started and want to stress that things will stay much as they are, including keeping the team, who will be helping them settle in.

They send the following message:

"Hello everyone, we are Les and Karen. We're excited to be moving to Quidhampton and we're looking forward to village life. We're moving from Marlborough and had several pubs before, most recently in Kingsclere and Old Basing. We have always enjoyed putting together delicious menus, and catering for the local community. We already love The White Horse and are keen to carry on running it just as it is. We look forward to meeting you in 2021, if not before. Merry Christmas to you all."

There will be more farewell words but it must be recorded here how much the village owes to Nick and Zoe. They were heroes of an astonishing kind during the first lockdown, running a village shop with free delivery and Reeves bread deliveries, at little or no profit to themselves. Their weekend fish and chip deliveries were a special treat. All this saved many of us from having to travel outside the village with all the infection risks those journeys would have created.

Then when it could open again The White Horse became a place where you felt really safe to eat, and the food seemed even more delicious. Now, as Nick and Zoe get ready to leave, our sympathies are with them during the illness of Nick's father. Everyone must wish them well as they prepare for the future they deserve where they can spend more time being with their families. **Remembrance Day** Villagers remembered our men who died as a result of the first world war in several ways. Wreaths were displayed again on the houses where the servicemen lived (Thanks to Tanya and Simon Angel for organising that) and several people put poppies on their houses or gardens. At 11.00 people stood at various points in Lower Road and Martin Hudson lowered the standard at the bottom of Footshill. Nearly 40 people were at the ceremony at the lychgate war memorial where the names were read aloud.

Bea Tilbrook put a poppy beside the name of William Stokes to keep a long tradition going. William's mother used to put a poppy there and when she died. his sister Dorothy took over. Dorothy herself died this year aged 104 and her daughter, Ann Langhurst, was unable to do it because her husband was very ill and died on 11 November. Ann grew up in Quidhampton and is remembered by older villagers.



#### **Recent news**

There are now several Covid cases in Lower Bemerton. Everyone will wish them well and a good recovery.

Several Quidhampton villagers have had close relatives who have been very ill or who have died recently, though none as far as is known, had Covid. Sympathy is extended to them all. With recent lockdown restrictions, it has been a quiet time for the Nature Project. Those of you who visit the play area will have noticed marking out of re-wilding areas where we want to restore natural flora and create interesting areas for children to explore and learn about our native wild plants and grasses.

We have been working with the Woodland Trust to secure trees and hedgerow for planting around the play area to provide much needed additional habitats for some of our wildlife. # Quidhampton's Plan for Civil Emergencies 2021 Edition

Blessed as we are with first-class local Emergency Services, it is unlikely that we will ever have to rely entirely on self-help during an emergency. However, as a community, we may well be first on the scene to provide help for those in need, and later be expected to support our Emergency Services. This help and support require village volunteers.

Because the different types of emergency are so numerous and would involve endless plans to deal with them (e.g. road or rail accidents, flooding, storm-damage and breakdown of utilities) our Emergency Plan mostly comprises the contact details of the local volunteers with skills and/or appropriate available equipment, as well as the contact details of the normal Emergency Services: Fire, Police and Ambulance, County Emergency-Planning offices, Medical Centres, Pharmacies, Clergy, Utilities, Highways, Veterinary surgeries.

This communication is therefore an earnest request for villagers to volunteer:

- a. the useful skills they have which could help in an emergency, e.g. first-aid, policing, roof repairs, plumbing, electricity, and hazardous tree removal.
- b. to mention any suitable equipment they might have, e.g. ladders, jacks, lights, cables, vans, trailers, as well as emergency accommodation.

- There is no Scout Christmas card post this year.
